Our Purpose and Goals

Why leave?

Our approach is oriented towards the sharing of experience. We will spend six months in Latin America, but our experience is intended be rewarding from the beginning of our preparations in France to our return flight home.

Our project focuses on the following objectives:

- Meetings and exchanges

The bicycle is an environmentally friendly mode of transportation. It especially allows for proximity -- we want to participate in daily life and establish contacts with the people we will encounter.

- Teaching

We included primary and secondary school students in our voyage preparation and execution, who will follow our adventure as we travel. To make this easier and more effective, our website will be updated regularly during our journey, while the classroom teachers will lead discussions, presentations and other history lessons on Latin America.

- Overcoming handicap

For this project we are helping the National Association of Congenital Heart (ANCC: Association Nationale des Cardiaques Congénitaux) which has agreed in return to be part of our partners. We will complete a report on heart disease, and how one can resume a more normal life after surgery. Because Hoëlig has a history of heart disease, he is very involved in this

We also hope that our adventure brings more attention to the ANCC and the important work that they do.

- Enjoyment

This trip will also be for us, to take advantage of the time we have to travel, quench our thirst for discovery, and enjoy this journey in very new and different surroundings.

Our Trip in Numbers

During our journey we hope to travel an average of 50 to 60 kilometers per day by bicycle, taking public transit when necessary. At this rate, we believe that we will need four and a half months to reach Cancun, leaving a 3 to 4-week margin to linger, explore and discover the surrounding areas at our own pace.

Route: 15,000 kilometers from Ushuaïa to Cancun

During this journey, we will cross many remarkable and unique locations; a large number of them are classified as World Heritage Sites by UNESCO.

We met with two classes of Quiberon's secondary school, which will follow our voyage via Internet part of their curriculum. A presentation of our project was made in the presence of journalists, followed by an informational exchange and a call for volunteers.

In return for a presentation on one of the countries on our route, we will find each student a correspondent from a school in their chosen country.

After having pitched a tent in the school as an example of our equipment, we presented our project to 4 classes, complete with equipment demonstrations and a Q and A session. The CE2-CM1 class will follow our progress in conjunction with work on the subjects mentioned below.

Daily Security

Recognizing that this trip also presents a risk to our health (physical or medical risks), we will leave equipped with an ARGOS type beacon (the same type as those embedded in the Vendée Globe sailing race), allowing us to locate ourselves and indicate our state of health to our families via internet, or trigger a process of repatriation in case of more serious problem.

We researched and purchased equipment based on meetings with people with similar travel experience who traveled with the same type.

For the preparation of our trip, we were inspired by books on this subject in order to make good decisions about choosing the right equipment, our itineraries and tips on cultural sensitivities to be aware of in certain countries.

Of course, we will start with a full rescue kit tailored to the regions traveled (designed with a specialist from the Latin American of Institute Pasteur of Lille) and all of our vaccines up to date.

Daily security:

Our contact with people who have already done this type of trip helped us prepare ourselves. We have a clear idea of where our camps lay and situations to avoid, and have prepared "theif bags*" -- just in case.

Daily Security

The SPOT system:

We will embark with a SPOT system beacon, which is a new generation system, similar to the "ARGOS beacon" but capable of transmitting signals such as "I'm fine" from our location to subscribers (like our parents). Our advancement up the coast will be visible on our website, thanks to SPOT points added automatically on the map.



Medical preparations:

The international vaccination centers have informed us about the risks and precautions necessary before a trip like this. We will have received all recommended vaccinations before our departure, and completed our safety training (PSC1: Prevention to Civic Aid level 1). Our personal experience hiking independently has provided us with the first aid and accident response skills.

Educational project

EDUCATIONAL PROJECT "THE DISCOVERY OF THE ANDES" SCHOOL YEARS 2008-2009 and 2009-2010

DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT

This project was born from the desire to get students at Beg er Vil School to open themselves internationally from meeting two young men who wish to share with the students the experience of their journey through South America by bike.

This project fits into more than one title in the Project preparation and echoes a comprehensive approach already undertaken in various areas.

It allows an opening for the cultural discovery of a continent of different cultures and geographies, histories and a reactivation of existing links between Britain and South America (their jouney will be made along the coastline and in highland areas which leads to a connection with the maritime mythology of Britain and Ushuaia). The work done thus enhances the school's identity as an institution linked to the sea, its traditions and history.

It helps develop the language component of the school plan through relationships with correspondents. The travelers intend to connect South American students with students at this school participating in the project.

This project hopes to provide a platform for cultural exchange in both the initial construction (research on destinations, suggestions of places to visit based on elements updated by students) and in monitoring the progress of the trip (regular contacts before, during and after).

It will also address more concretely the themes related to citizenship (cultural differences, discovery and respect for others and the difference, racism and Human Rights).

PROJECT PARTICIPANTS

The involvement of the students in the project is spread over two academic years (2008-2009 and 2009-2010). It can hardly be followed by one class in particular. Moreover, a subject of this nature imposed on students does not seem to be adequate for retaining the attention of students.

Annexes

It was therefore decided that the project would be offered on a voluntary basis among the pupils of current 5th and 6th grades.

The group will accompany the project:

- In its preparation phase
- In its progress through regular contacts via Internet
- Exchanging personalized with a correspondent from a country crossed by the selected student (this approach would increase the involvement of students in learning the Spanish language if chosen as a second foreign language)
- The experience could be shared by other college students through lectures, photo exhibitions, etc)

FREQUENCY OF MEETINGS AND TRADE

February 24th, 2009 was the first meeting between Hoëlig and classes of 5th and 6th grades for the presentation of the project.

This meeting led to the informal training of the group of student volunteers who will commit to participating in this project. This will require the phase of reflection at regular intervals with contacts between the group and the organizers of the trip to measure the progression and evolution of the project.

During the second meeting with Hoëlig, project coordinators outlined that regular contacts are to be expected during the period of 6 months that will last the entirety of the trip, via Internet or by webcam if possible.

A third meeting will be scheduled upon the return of the voyagers, in which the students will present their work for the rest of the group and other students at the school.
